### TOP FIVE REASONS TO BE SURE YOU QUALIFY FOR THE NORTH AMERICAN PAIRS DISTRICT FINALS

#5-You can win red points in qualifying club games.

#4-You can earn a Red or a Blue Ribbon Qualification by winning the district finals in your flight.

#3-You can win red AND GOLD points at the district finals.

#2-You can win double digit point awards by winning the district finals.\*

#1-You will earn a financial subsidy to attend the National Finals of the event.\*\*

To be sure you know which flight is yours, think or look back to your May 6th computer cycle (the points that showed up on the back of your June ACBL Bulletin). If you were a Non-Life Master with fewer than 500 masterpoints at that time, you can play in Flight C. If you had fewer than 2500 masterpoints at that time, then you can play in Flight B. All others are in Flight A.

Are you curious what happens after you qualify in a club game in June, July or August? You win the honor of playing in the district-wide finals on Saturday and possibly Sunday, October 28th and 29th. The two clubs holding these finals for District 9 are the St. Petersburg Bridge Club on the west coast and the Palm Coast Bridge Club on the east coast (north of Daytona). As we go to press, it hasn't been decided yet whether there will be an electronic component added to the brick and mortar finals event. Watch the District 9 web site, district 9 acbl.org, for updates.

One last note: you are expected to be a resident of District 9 on June 1st, in order to be eligible to play in the District 9 NAP Finals. If you have any questions about your eligibility, start by reading the Conditions of Contest posted at ACBL.org. Two full pages address how to determine if you are eligible to play in the district you wish. Then continue by verifying your eligibility by writing to NAP Chair Shirley Seals at ShirleySealsFL@aol.com.

\*Awards depend on several things, which are based on the number of pairs who enter the event. The winners of Flight C might win 10 or 12.50 or even 15 masterpoints (25% gold). The winners of Flight B might win 16 or 20 or 24 masterpoints, all gold. The winners of Flight A might win 24, 30 or 36 masterpoints, all gold.

\*\*The Finals are scheduled for March of 2017 at the Philadelphia Spring NABCs.

Four of these clubs are in Palm Beach County, where a whopping 70,000 tables of bridge were played at sanctioned club games in 2016.

Special congratulations to The Villages Duplicate Bridge Club, whose table count increased from 2015 by over 1600 tables! The Villages is an invitational club, mandated by its location, so only residents of The Villages, a community of over 100,000 active seniors, plus invited guests, are allowed to play there. There were other big increases, led by one of those Palm Beach County clubs. Temple Sinai DBC in Delray Beach increased its number of tables by 1481 tables, or 22%! Other clubs with increases of over 10% include Mandel JCC in Palm Beach Gardens; Duplicate Bridge Club of Sun City Center, in Sun City Center; and North Orlando BC in Altamonte Springs.

If you're curious to see how your own club compares to clubs around ACBL or around District 9 or your own unit, you can find this info, for the current year as well as for past years, by going online to acbl.org, then choosing CLUBS from the far left, then Club Table Counts, the third choice down on the left.

We reached out to successful clubs around Florida, not just the eleven that were in the top 50, but others who also have continued to provide sanctioned games for local players for decades. We asked if they'd care to comment on what might have worked for them recently, or what they think contributes to their success.

Jim Geary of the Daytona Metropolitan BC, where there were almost 200 more tables in '16 than in '15, told us:

"The most exciting and rewarding change we did at Daytona Metropolitan Bridge Club this year was to offer 0-50 members half price game fees in our 0-799 game. Our Friday Open game was struggling holding three tables; so in deciding to offer an additional 0-799 game we added the special half price enticement for 0-50 players. We quickly increased our table count to fourteen! Open players benefited and were pleased by scoring more points because of the concurrent games.

"Another exciting change we made is taking full advantage of ACBL charity games. [This] allow[s] us to [contribute to] many local charities throughout the year [while the games] award considerably more points. Receiving more points is particularly thrilling to members in our limited games who receive less points for their limited games."

Sometimes bridge clubs get great publicity in local newspapers and magazines. The Vero

Beach Bridge Club, a member-owned club with plenty of helpful volunteers to assist the club manager, was featured in Vero Beach Magazine in February. Certainly a membership of 1000 is something of which they are very proud! One volunteer, Martha Glassmeyer, told us how to find the article, and you might enjoy reading it. It's short but pithy and has a lovely photo. Go to verobeachmagazine.com and scroll down to Articles. In the Archives, you're looking for February, and the name of the article is Grand Slam. The Villages BC has been growing in leaps and bounds in the past several years, and the current Head Director, Paul Matheson, tells us why.

The growth of The Villages Bridge Club has been phenomenal. In 2011 the club hosted 7,037 tables, the 27th most in the ACBL. In 2016, growth had elevated its standing to the 4th most tables in the ACBL with 12,888 tables! An increase of almost 80%! There are three main reasons for the growth:

1. Demographics: We are located in one of the fastest growing over-55 developments in the United States. At this time there are approximately 110,000 residents in The Villages and the end is not in sight. The developer has just announced the purchase of land allowing for an additional 14,000 new homes to be built. These new residents will be retired, usually well-educated, and looking for new challenges and activities such as bridge.

Our club has created new opportunities for these residents to learn the game and keep them interested. We offer many basic, intermediate and advanced bridge seminars to get people into the game. We also offer 20, 50, 100, 299, 399 and 750 limited master point games so the members can compete at their own levels.

- 2. Villages support: The Villages Recreation Department has provided us with many of the tools necessary to maintain a successful program such as equipment, supplies, and venues. A downside to our program is the lack of a single venue to play. We play our games in seven different venues. This creates its own problems but they are surmountable.
- 3. A cadre of enthusiastic volunteers: Like any successful organization, success is based on the support of volunteers. We have been fortunate to have so many interested and active volunteers.

The reasons for our past success are still present and we expect the growth to continue. It is our hope that we will have the most tables in the ACBL by 2020!

Another club blessed with wonderful volunteers is St. Augustine Bridge Club, and JoAnn Vergnolle is one of them. She chose to honor two players from the Vero Beach Bridge Club, for something that didn't happen in Florida, but half-way 'round the world. JoAnn and many other bridge players were on a Holland America cruise in the far east. A few cruise lines still offer daily duplicate with ACBL masterpoint games on every cruise, but Holland America isn't one of them any more.

JoAnn says: "On our ship, we had two directors from Vero Beach who volunteered to run duplicate games each sea day for all the players on board. It was a true labor of love and for the love of the game. We had 15-16 tables each day and eventually our sheer determination to play brought the ship around to providing beverages and snacks. These two directors did all the hands, posted scores, made a little competitive journey for us. The wonder of it all is that we got no masterpoints and they got no money or benefit, and yet we all played each day for the love of the game and made many new friends."

Jack Brawner is the club manager at the Naples Bridge Center, in a town that has two clubs in the top 50 of ACBL as well as two other successful clubs. Jack sent us a wonderful set of thoughts on running a successful bridge club. Here they are!

Greetings! We are experiencing nice growth here at our member-owned club in Naples, and expect to keep doing so.

This is a business. It may not be a "typical" business, but it is a business. There are some unique aspects, though. An important question to ask ourselves: "What is our competition for the recreational dollar?"

Very few businesses have the ability to create their own customers, but we do! By offering lessons constantly, we want to create new bridge players – new customers – on a regular and ongoing basis. Here in Florida, \*some\* of the new residents (usually retirees) may be bridge players, but a great many of them are newly retired, and looking for a hobby (even if they don't know it yet). We can be that hobby. We are competing with everything from golf to Mah Jongg for these potential new players.

Obviously, some people already play bridge, and we want them to choose OUR club to play in. Geography is of vital importance (we have all heard "location, location, location"), but there are more controllable factors as well.

How is the customer's experience from the moment they pull into the lot?

*Is the parking plentiful and safe?* 

*Is the entrance clean, well lit, well marked, etc?* 

When they enter, is it obvious where to go and what to do? Are they greeted?

*Is the hospitality (food & drink) a good, neutral, or poor experience?* 

Is the game a well-run game that starts and ends on time?

Is the director well-versed in the laws, and does he/she apply them fairly?

Are director calls a pleasant or unpleasant experience?

Do we thank them for coming?

Is scoring done promptly, and accurately? Is it posted online?

Not only do most bridge clubs have a competing bridge club somewhere, let's not ignore the games at city halls or community centers. Why should a resident of the Shady Rest Condo Super-Conglomerate drive to our club? We must offer something that the local clubhouse does not – better competition, a more professionally-run game, a larger game, more masterpoints, a lesson schedule, parties, special events, and anything else you can think of.

Many of these things could be summed up in one word: atmosphere. How is the atmosphere at your club?

And, if you want to ensure the retardation of your growth (or go into a downward spiral), here are some great ideas:

Tolerate rude behavior, as long as he/she is a regular customer.

Have grouchy or condescending directors. The players need to be whipped into shape.

 $Make\ sure\ there\ is\ lots\ of\ drama\ and\ feuding\ going\ on-it\ keep\ things\ interesting.$ 

Do the minimum as far as cleanliness, supplies, equipment, and hospitality – after all, these things cost money, right?

Don't ever be available to answer questions from new players. Sell them a book instead. Ok, I could expand on almost anything I have already said, but I am sure Muriel has space considerations. I am grateful that I inherited a good situation and am working with (for) a good Board of Governors here in Naples.

# Counting To Avoid

# A Guess

Today's deal from a local club game provides a good lesson in declarer-play technique. The bidding shown was common at many tables: After West's preemptive opening, North made a takeout double (a little light perhaps, but it's difficult to pass) and South could not resist jumping to Blackwood and bidding six notrump.

The final contract is sound, and in fact superior to a slam in clubs. Why? Because in notrump declarer can postpone his guess for the queen of clubs, whereas in clubs declarer must make this decision immediately for fear of a ruff. With none vulnerable,

Let's consider the play as it might have occurred at three different tables.

"Average Joe" was declarer at table one. After winning the second heart lead, he considered the play of the club suit. He had a combined holding of nine cards and, because of the bridge maxim, "eight ever; nine never," he knew never to finesse for the queen. Therefore, Joe cashed the top clubs and made his contract. Well done.

"Thoughtful Tom" was at the wheel at table two. He also won the second heart lead and considered the play of the club suit. He knew the normal percentage play holding nine cards, but this was not a normal situation. With hearts breaking seven-one, the odds greatly favored East to hold longer clubs. Therefore, Tom led a club to dummy's ace and finessed the jack on the way back. Oops! Down six.

"Expert Ernie" held the South cards at table three. He too won the second heart lead: but he was in no hurry to tackle the club suit. To find out more about the enemy distribution, he cashed all his winners in the other suits. Ernie learned that West began with exactly two spades and two diamonds. Combining this with the known seven-card heart suit, left West with two clubs — no more, and no less. Consequently, cashing the clubs from the top was a 100-percent guarantee.

It should be apparent that Joe's success was lucky. Tom, of course, was unlucky. And Ernie? He didn't need any luck.

# Am I Getting Older, or Wiser?

Editor's Note: This article is a blast from the past by Larry, written before he retired from actually playing bridge! We hope you enjoy it.



I get a chuckle when people complain about getting old. "The alternative," I tell them, "is much worse." We are all getting older, of course, but with that is supposed to come wisdom.

In bridge, we also get wiser with age. Youthfulness is usually equated with wildness in the bidding. I used to be a reckless preempter. Now, I am more disciplined. When it comes to opening the bidding, I am also moderating my ways. No, I'm not going into one of those ultra-sound shells (a la the "Roth-Stone school"). I still believe that striking the first blow is the way to go -- I hope I never become a stodgy opening bidder. Still, there is room to learn. Recently, I dealt with this hand:

- **♦** 5
- ♥ QJ42
- ♦ AK 10
- ♣J10765

In the past, I wouldn't have asked "Am I vulnerable?" I wouldn't have cared if it was matchpoints or IMPs. I would have just opened the bidding 1♣, and gone on with my life. I have 11 HCP plus 1 for this, 1 for that-good enough. Alternatively, the Rule of 20 would dictate opening this hand (11 HCP, 5-4 in the longest suits).

However, a new and more mature guideline has entered my brain. I look ahead to the future. I ask myself, "What



will happen if I open 1♣ with this borderline hand?" The answers are mostly negative. For one, partner might lead a club (from, say, Kxx, or Axx). That

wouldn't be so good. Even worse, it might be our hand. What do you think partner will respond? You know how partners are. Surely, you can look forward to the pleasure of his 1♠ response. Now what? The death rebid. You can't rebid notrump with a singleton, can't rebid your 5-card suit, and can't reverse into 2♥. You can't pass, so you have to make one of those lovely rebids. Yuk! So, why not show a little maturity and not open? I gave it a try. (It hurt a little, but I got over it).

What happened next? I actually got to have a good auction. LHO opened the bidding 1, and my partner overcalled 2. RHO passed, and I got to make a splinter bid of 3. The hand was off my chest. I had painted a nice picture of my shape and strength, and I managed this all without opening the bidding. Had the opponents bid and raised spades, I could have entered the auction with a takeout double, again providing a good description.

Anyway, I'm still opening light, but when awkward hands arise, I have become

emotionally capable of passing. I hope it doesn't ruin my reputation.

Another facet of maturity (age?) is the development of a sane preemptive philosophy.



The younger they are, the more they bid. This philosophy isn't restricted only to the young -- I see many tournament players that bid every time it is their turn. They preempt with 5-card suits, and they don't care about suit quality.

Why?

Having played such a style (in my Marty-Bergen days), I feel well qualified to comment. Opening 2♥ with, say:

- **★**52
- ♥J87642
- ♦ A 3 2
- **♣**75

is what I'm talking about. Such actions certainly can work. You might preempt the opponents (especially if partner can raise) and force them into a ridiculous position. Opening 2♥ could easily hit a homerun. But, there is the flip side. It can often strike out. It is a real swingy, "top-bottom" action.

I prefer to go more down the middle. I wouldn't open 2♥ with that hand, but would do so, with:

- **★**52
- ♥QJ9842
- ♦ A 3 2
- **♣**75

This is still not a good-enough suit/hand for the really stodgy crowd, but I think they need to loosen up a little. They would probably need at least the •10, and maybe even that wouldn't be sufficient. They hardly ever get dealt a hand on which they can preempt.

So, what qualifies me to recommend this middle ground? Having played all 3 styles (sound, medium, and aggressive) I can tell you that I've seen it all. I am 100% convinced that "medium" is the long-run winner. If I had to give up "medium," the next-best would be "aggressive." I don't like the pain of enduring the strikeouts, but there are almost as many homeruns and fun to make up for it. In a weak field, especially, aggressive is not a bad way to go.



#### **SOUND -- RED LIGHT**

As far as "sound," count me out. I have seen first hand how this is clearly a losing preemptive strategy. Yes, on the few deals where it comes up (i.e. you actually get to preempt) you are usually a winner (partner gauges the auction, opening lead, and/or defense quite well). However, the sound preempters are losing out big time by not setting enough problems for their opponents. I love to play against such (non)preempters. They never get in my way; life is good when the opponents are in love with passing.

# Play Hard, Play Well: A Strong Line of Play

You reach a good 6 contract. See if you can find the best line of play to win your Swiss team match. Dummy hits and you see:

- ♠ AKJ10xx
- ♥ Qxx
- **♦ O 9**
- ♣ 10 x
- **♠** X
- **♥** X
- ♦ AK 10 x x x
- AKQxx

LHO finds the best lead of the ♥A and continues with a low ♥. Plan your play!

There are many play options on this hand. Assuming the  $\bullet$  split, we have  $6\bullet$ ,  $2\bullet$ , and  $3\bullet$  for 11 tricks. We can obtain a 12th trick a variety of different ways - in  $\bullet$ ,  $\bullet$ , or even with the  $\heartsuit$ O.

We cannot ruff a ♠ to try to set that suit up, because we do not have an entry to the ♠ outside the trump and we cannot draw trump ending on the dummy. In ♠ we must either play for the drop of the ♠Q or take a finesse. But there is no rush to make this decision.

Should we ruff a •? What is the danger in trying to ruff a •? If we carefully study the situation we will see that most of the layouts where ruffing a • would help us we can cover with a squeeze (when • split 4-2), and thus risking the overruff of 4-2 • is not worth it. (If • are 3-3 we will make it for sure!) If we draw trump and run all our trump we can come to the end position at the top of the next column.

Now, no one player can guard the ♣ and ♠ (6-card ending with someone needing ♠Qxx and 4-card ♣), so if someone had both of those holdings, they were already squeezed. Additionally, if East has 4-card ♣ and no ♠Q, then we can squeeze them in ♥ and ♣ by

♣ AKJ10
▼ Q
◆ ♣ 10



cashing two ♠ now. The only layout of the cards where the squeeze does not work is if East has the protected ♠Q and West has 4-card ♠, but if this was the lay of the cards, then East may have been overruffing our previous plan to ruff a ♠ (if they have the ♠J).

So we cash the ♠A and ♠K and see what good things happen! And we will make on all 3-3 ♠ splits and most 4-2 ♠ splits (and even some 6-1 ♠ splits).

One other note about playing for a squeeze in these positions instead of banking on ruffing a  $\clubsuit$  or playing for a  $\spadesuit$  finesse is that you also give the opponents an opportunity to make a mistake – something that happens more often than they would like!

The complete deal was the following, so many lines would have been successful!



# Flairand Technique

One of the world's best ever players was Giorgio Belladonna of Italy. A many time World Champion, Giorgio was a great character, with both a sense of humour and a warm personality. He visited Glasgow, Scotland, came to our house and told me many stories, including from when he was a professional soccer player.

In 1974, Michael Rosenberg and I had the privilege of playing against Belladonna and Garozzo for the UK vs. Italy in Vittel, France. This was possibly the world's best ever two players in partnership. Belladonna was one of the few players to display both wonderful flair and also strong technique.

I watched him lead against 3N holding AK108xx. He led the 10, dummy had the singleton 9 and declarer QJxx. Nice shot! Here is a hand where he displayed his technique.

Contract: 4♠ by South

Belladonna had opened 1♠ and was raised to 4♠. West led the ♣J. How would you play?

His first move was to guard against four spades in either hand by leading the ♠K. When both defenders followed suit, he played a low spade to the Ace on which East pitched the \$\infty\$5.

The danger is, you may lose two diamonds, a heart and a spade if all cards lay badly. A diamond finesse can lose as can a heart finesse and a second diamond. Can you see the solution?

He cashed the ♣AKQ pitching a heart from dummy. Now, he led the ♥A and the ♥O. East won, played a diamond and West won, but was now endplayed. Had West won the first heart, he would have had to play a diamond from the KQ. Thus the contract was guaranteed in this fashion



# FAB Responses to Strong 24 Openings

Warning: The opportunity to use this convention is rare, which greatly increases the probability that at least one member of the partnership will succumb to the memory coup and forget that it is the agreement.

Many players use an artificial 2♦ bid on virtually all occasions when responding to partner's strong and artificial 2♣ opening. Since the opening 24-bidder frequently responds 2NT to a 2 response, the partnership's tools over notrump will often come into play. This in turn ensures that the stronger hand will declare more contracts, thus satisfying an important partnership objective.

An increasing number of partnerships now supplement the 2♦ bid with an artificial 2♥ bid by responder to show hands that are exceptionally weak, those with neither an ace nor king, for example. The bid has strong merit, yet it is marred with one noticeable flaw. All the good intentions of "right-siding" the hand in favor of the stronger holding will often be sacrificed when the final contract is hearts. The partnership will have successfully "wrong-sided" the contract, with responder's pathetic holding being concealed while the opening lead cuts into a tenace-rich dummy. The two hands below demonstrate the problem.

In each situation, South opens 2♣ and partner responds 2 showing a weak hand. A 2NT rebid by opener follows, which in turn elicits responder's Stayman probe with the first hand, and a Texas Transfer with the second. In both cases the optimum contract of 4 is reached, yet declared by the wrong hand.

Within the framework of the above approach, no response to an artificial 2. opening presently exists aside from the artificial waiting bid of 2, or the weaknessshowing 2. Consequently, partnerships may assign any meaning they wish to other bids without compromising their bidding structure. Allowing an additional artificial bid of 2♠, in lieu of 2♥, to show weak hands, which also happen to contain four or more hearts, will occasionally provide a partnership advantage. If the 2♣ opener subsequently responds 2NT, then bids hearts following either a Stayman or a transfer bid, an eventual heart contract will be successfully "right-sided." The challenge of assuring that the strong opener declares the contract when responder holds a weak hand, along with length in both majors, can be resolved by employing the following methods:

- 1) Holding a weak hand with six-four in the majors, responder initially bids 2NT. Opener may inquire about partner's exact shape with a rebid of 3. In a manner, similar to the Smolen convention, responder subsequently bids his four-card suit (i.e. 3\,\text{\psi} shows additional length in spades while 34 shows extra length in hearts).
- 2) Holding a weak hand with exactly five-four shape in the majors, responder initially bids 3. Opener may inquire about partner's shape with a rebid of 3. As in the previous example, responder rebids his shorter major.

# Find Your Place

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A few decades ago (well, maybe more than a few) all Pair games were Open. There was no stratification and everyone played everyone else. The occasional larger club had a novice game, but at most clubs and all tournaments Open was just that—no nuances or variation to speak of. Sometimes there was a "Masters" game which you had to have (gasp!) 50 points to participate. All team games were Open and win-lose. Lose by even one point and you were out. Not surprisingly, team games weren't very popular.

Anyone looking at today's tournament schedules sees many changes, most brought about by bracketing and stratifying.

Bracketed KOs: Divide the field by masterpoints into separate competitive groups. The number of brackets, their range of points and the masterpoints awarded are all determined by who shows up. Not until all the entries have been sold can the Directors determine the makeup of the brackets. The bigger the field, the more brackets and the narrower the point range will be in each bracket. When the turnout is small and the brackets consequently broad, sometimes the conditions of contest allow handicapping. This is not up to the directors, nor do we determine what the handicaps will be. Conditions are set by the sponsoring organization (Club, Unit, District) and handicapping is a function of the ACBL scoring program.

Even with handicapping, KOs are still a "lose and snooze" affair. Bracketed Swiss and Swiss teams allow everyone to play for the entire session or event.

Bracketed Swiss: As in KOs, the brackets are determined by who shows up, but then all teams in the bracket participate in a round robin with each team playing all the others. Again, the field may be small which can lead to broad ranges in the brackets.

Swiss Teams: This is a stratified event, with players of all levels competing together in one large field. During the event, matches are determined not by strata but by Victory Point totals. Then at the end A players must beat everyone to get points, B players must beat B and C players, and C players can get some points just by prevailing over other Cs.

Limited Games, like Seniors (limited by age) or Gold Rush (limited by masterpoint holdings) don't pay as well as Open games because the players are protected from some of the competition. ACBL regulations require that the ceiling of the highest stratum be at least 750 in order for Gold points to be awarded.

Flighted (Strati-Flighted) events divide the field into separate groups and may also have stratification within the Flight. You'll see a schedule with A/X and B/C pairs, for instance, where the two groups are separate flights and then have stratification within the flight. If there are 20 tables in the A/X and 20 more in the B/C, the A/X game masterpoints are calculated as if there were 40 tables in their event, but the B/C gets credit only for their 20.

What color will your points be? All points at Sectionals are Silver. Most points at Regionals are Red, with Gold being awarded for Section Tops, and overall winners. Even at NABCs, most events are Regionally rated and offer mainly Red points. In addition, at Regional and National events, all single session events pay in red points, whether or not they are limited. A single session Swiss, for instance, is a Red point event. Even two session events which have a lower top value than 750 will offer only Red points. If you see a Sectional which offers a Regionally-rated event, the awards will still be Silver. Such special games must be benefits for one of ACBL's charities or educational endeavors.

# Defending DONT And Natural Overcalls

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Larry Cohen wrote an excellent article on DONT, "Disturb Opponents (One) No Trump", SBN May-June 2017, pages 20-21. Here, we shall discuss three topics: (1) How to defend against DONT (2) How to defend against natural suit overcalls of 1NT, and (3) Making sure that if you use DONT, you do not violate the spirit of the ACBL convention chart. Stolen bids, transfers (including Texas Transfers), and Lebensohl are the fundamental tools in defending against any form of interference over your 1NT. For an excellent discussion of Lebensohl, see https://www.bridgehands.com/L/Lebensohl.htm

#### Recommended Defense vs. DONT

In what follows, we define a "Good Hand" opposite an opening 1NT as at least a good 8 high card points (HCP), for example two aces or a five card suit headed by the KQ and an outside K. Hands with 9+ HCP are also good.

Despite your opponents' proper explanation, when you inquire about their alert of their two-suited bids, still it is vital to ask DONT's (or other systems') partner what shapes and strengths the bidder can have. They are obligated to fully disclose this. To avoid giving your partner unauthorized information, always ask this whether or not you intend to bid.

Play STOLEN Bids. (i) Almost half of twosuited DONT bids are 2♣ (♣ and a higher suit), so Double is Stayman, and all other calls are basically unchanged from 1NT(P). But see (iv). (ii) One third are 2♠. Here Double is a transfer to ♠, ♥ is a transfer to ♠, 2♠ is a transfer to 3♣ with a good hand, 2NT is Lebensohl (see link above), 3♠ is Stayman without a♠ stopper. If you bid 2NT (Lebensohl) then 3♠ over partner's forced 3♠ is Stayman with a♠ stopper. DONT worry about the undisclosed suit. (iii) Only one in six bid 2♥ (majors): Double is negative for the minors, 2♠ is a transfer to ♠ with a good hand, 3♠ is a transfer to ♦ with a good hand. You can immediately, or after partner responds to a negative double, or after transferring, bid 3♥ (with ♥ stop not ♣ stop) or 3♠ (♠ stop not ♥ stop). Slow: 2NT then 3NT over 3♠ has both majors stopped. A direct 3NT has neither major stopped, with no 5-card minor. With weak hands, competing for a part score in a minor, use Lebensohl 2NT, and you can play 3♠ (pass partner's 3♠) or convert to ♦ (bid 3♦ over 3♠, to play). Note: Do not make a negative double with both majors stopped and game-going values.

If they show a one-suited hand by doubling, you have all of your bids available. But if they bid 2♠ (one suiter), ask them what the difference between direct 2♠ and double then 2♠ is. We cover defenses to natural overcalls in (2) below.

(iv) DONT opponents give you excellent chances to collect big penalties. Say the opponent bids 2♦ and you have a 4 card ♦ stack and a good hand. You have the safe option of passing. Remember double by you would be a transfer to ♥. My partners will not let 2♦ die if it goes 2♦-P-P(3 card♦ support). Partner, with a doubleton ♦ will always balance, usually with a takeout double. Now the opponents are in trouble. You can have 10 HCP or even more. Remember your LHO will always pull with a doubleton ♦, so you are in no danger of getting this passed out. If they run, usually double and usually lead trump.

#### Defending against natural two-level overcalls over 1NT

Over 2♣ and 2♠ overcalls, defend exactly per DONT. No extra memory is involved here.

Over 2♥ and 2♠, think Transfer+Lebensohl. (i)

Over 1NT(2♥), double is a stolen bid (transfer to ♠), 2♠ is a transfer to ♣ with a good hand, 2NT is Lebensohl, 3♣ is a transfer to 3♦ with a good hand, 3♥ is Stayman (good hand) without a ♥ stopper. Immediate 3NT denies a ♥ stopper. If

you transfer to ♠ and then bid 3♥ (slow: you have a ♥ stopper), if you bid 3NT over partner's 2♠ response (fast, you deny a ♥ stopper). Likewise, if you bid 2NT then 3♥ over partner's forced 3♣ bid, this is Stayman with a ♥ stopper. Note that once you bid 2NT, there are no more transfers after partner's 3♣. (ii) Over 1NT(2♠), there is less room, so I recommend double as a transfer to ♣ with a good hand, 2NT=Lebensohl, 3♣ and 3♦ as transfers to ♦ and ♥, with good hands respectively. After transferring, you can bid 3♠ (spade stopper) or 3NT (no spade stopper). Stayman is bid by 3♠ over 2♠ (no ♠ stopper), or 2NT followed by 3♠ (with ♠ stopper). Again, there are no transfers after partner responds 3♣ to vour Lebensohl 2NT.

#### Advice to DONT users.

If the opponents ask, reveal your complete partnership understanding. It is inappropriate to just answer "DONT". Your card already tells them what suits you could have. What is the point count range and what suit lengths in both suits (not just one) do you promise? Larry Cohen recommends 5-4 or more shapelier, but a large number will use it with 4-4, especially when not vulnerable. DONT zealots place no point count requirements on their bids, with for example, ♣-Jxxx ▼-xx ♣-Jxxx ♣-xxx qualifying as a 2♠ bid.

If you play DONT, you are ethically obligated to know and explain your exact agreement.

The ACBL convention chart specifically states under Disallowed: "Conventions and/or agreements whose primary purpose is to destroy the opponents' methods." Larry Cohen does not endorse such DONT zealotry, but many pairs do use it with a near Yarborough and any 4-4 shape. For these players, many DONT bids violate the spirit if not the letter of this regulation. There is a fine line between being purely destructive and ethically obstructive. In addition, there are many other commonly used conventions that can be viewed in the same light as DONT. The ACBL needs to clarify exactly what this chart prohibition means.

This is a major issue for our District 9 club games, where inexperienced players, the lifeblood of our clubs, are intimidated by destructive bidding, which has a discouraging impact on these players' enjoyment of duplicate bridge.

The Gainesville Bridge Clubs have recently defined what destructive bidding is for a variety of situations. For DONT, hands with fewer than 7 Goren points including distribution are off limits. This is actually both liberal and objective. Violations will be recorded. There will be no penalties involved in recording, but patterns cannot be detected without such evidence.

On the opening lead of the ◆5, North won with the ◆A and continued with the ◆2. South won with the ◆J and switched to a low ♣. You guess correctly, playing low, North wins with the ♣ A and switches to the ▼4. Plan the play.

It would have helped to be able to draw trumps first and learn something about the ♥ split by revealing the ♠ distribution. North's play forces you to make the decision right away. The primary guiding light is to use all of the information from what has happened so far. But that is not sufficient. You also have to base your play on what would have happened under various scenarios, that did not materialize.

The right play is to go up with the ▼A! North has shown two aces already, and if he had the ◆K, he would have played the ◆AK on the first two rounds so South has it. But S did not lead the ◆K.

so she cannot have both the \*KQ! Ergo, North holds the \*Q, which adds up to 10 HCP, and the failure to open the bidding means he cannot have the \*K. So you go up with the \*A, triumphantly dropping the \*K singleton, and make your contract. Seventy-three pairs took nine tricks, 30 pairs ten tricks, and six pairs somehow managed to take 11 tricks. Of course not all pairs could take advantage of the information provided when their opponents decided to interfere on the second round. Sometimes it pays to stay quiet. Note that the vulnerability makes a sacrifice unprofitable. Here is the full board:

# Two Over One (Almost) Game Forcing, Mike Lawrence Style

The last two issues (March/April) and (May/June) have discussed 1NT forcing vs. semi-forcing by an unpassed hand. To give a partnership a much more flexible way to set the final contract, here is an additional argument for making 1NT 100% forcing by an unpassed hand. Would you like to bid a non-forcing 1NT over partner's 1♥ opener with the following?

**★**32 **♥**5

**♦**KQ10983

**♣**1832

Our discussion is limited to first or second seat openings of one of a major.

Today, most players play two over one as a game force, 1NT response to 1♥/1♠ as forcing, and many play Bergen raises. There is much to recommend Mike Lawrence's style where 2/1 is forcing to game, unless the suit is repeated. This gives you another tier of showing strength with a six-card suit ranked below partner's opener.

Lawrence wrote: If responder bids a suit at the two level and opener makes a minimum rebid in a suit and responder then rebids his suit at the three revel, he is showing an invitational hand with a good six or seven-card suit.

Using this approach:

- (1) A rebid of opener's suit at the two level may show six.
- (2) If NT is bid [at the second opportunity by either partner], a game force is established.
- (3) A rebid at the three level establishes a game force.

One more caution: You should not bid 2/1 with a five card suit, unless you plan it as game forcing. [Otherwise, to put on the brakes, you are likely to have to rebid an unsupported five-card suit.]

- 3) Holding a weak hand with four-four in the majors, responder's first bid is 3♦.
- 4) An initial bid of 3NT by responder shows a weak hand and five-five in the majors.
- 5) An initial bid of 4♣ by responder shows a weak hand with six or more hearts and exactly five spades.
- 6) An initial bid of 4♦ by responder shows a weak hand with exactly five hearts along with six or more spades.

Below is a complete summary of the artificial bids that responder has available when responding to partner's strong and artificial opening of 2.

- 2. Artificial, with game-going values.
- 2♥-Weak hand containing fewer than four hearts. May hold four or more spades.
- 2♠-Weak hand containing four or more hearts and fewer than four spades.

2NT-Weak hand, 6-4 in the majors. Opener may inquire with a 3♣ rebid.

- 3♣-Weak hand, 5-4 in the majors. Opener may inquire with a 3♦ rebid.
- 3\u2224-Weak hand, exactly 4-4 in the majors.
  3NT-Weak hand, exactly 5-5 in the majors.
- 4♣-Weak hand, 6+ hearts and exactly 5 spades.
- 4♦-Weak hand, 6+ spades and exactly 5 hearts

Allow me to make a plea for playing above your usual point level from time to time. While I don't have any fond nostalgia for what it was like when I started in duplicate in 1961 (no strats, no brackets much of anywhere—not even handicapping), I do know that playing in a game with much superior competition was good for my bridge skills. If you are winning a lot in a limited event, try dipping your toes in tougher competition. Leave the 299ers and play in the Gold Rush. Leave the Gold Rush and play in a stratified Open or in the B/C of a flighted event. You may be pleasantly surprised when you win a lot more points for the same effort!

#### **Five More Rules**

My first 15 rules are discussed in the January/February and March/April, 2017 Sunshine Bridge News. The last advice given in the first article bears repeating: "When One Great Scorer comes to write against your name, He marks, not that you won or lost, but how you played the game." -Grantland Rice

### 16. Play against good players as often as possible.

When I first started playing in college many years ago, there weren't all the levels of stratified events. So most of the time, we learned the game in the same field as many of the top experts of the era. Of course, it's a terrific feeling to do well and add to your masterpoint total. However, if you want to improve, one of the best ways is to compete against better players. Sometimes this is not easy to do, because the events are limited by the number of points you have. But when you have a chance, enter the open game instead of the limited one at your club or in a tournament. Sure, you'll learn some humility (which is great to keep your ego in check) and you'll improve your game if you study and work on building a solid partnership. Some clubs have mentor programs where you can have the opportunity for a game with a more experienced player.

### 17. "The harder you practice, the luckier you get."

This true quote has been uttered by a number of top athletes including Gary Player and Michael Jordan. You have seen countless players who come to the club or tournament week after week (and there's certainly nothing wrong with the social aspect of our fantastic game) without attempting to learn anything new. They simply do the best they can and are usually satisfied with the results. Whatever you are devoting your time to, why not strive to be the best you can be; it doesn't matter whether it's your family, occupation or playing a game. Try to balance your bridge hours between playing, reading books and articles, improving your partnership(s), and evaluating your past results with your partner.

## 18. Stay in shape by finding activities that give you more stamina.

Although it might surprise you, many of the best bridge players in the world spend much of

their spare time improving their physical and mental capabilities away from the table. They schedule time at the gym regularly or have a normal routine of walking, jogging or running. No matter what level player you are, the benefits can be tremendous. And research has shown that meditation, yoga, tai chi and other similar activities improve every part of your life. I learned to meditate almost 50 years ago; I practice it twice a day and having some quiet time by yourself away from all the distractions of life is priceless. Choose activities that stimulate you, because everyone has a different perspective on what is fun to do or at least tolerable in your daily life.

#### 19. Learn the Law of Restricted Choice

In its simplest form: If you are missing four cards in a suit including the queen and the jack, and you are in a position to take a finesse after one of these honors appears on the first trick, you should do so. This may seem to contradict "Eight ever, nine never", but the odds are about 2 to 1 that the finesse is the winning play. One example:

A 10 6 5 2

4 Q K873

When you lead the K from the South hand, West plays the 4 and you play the 2 from North (the dummy), the Q appears from East. When you lead the second round of the suit from South (the 3) and West plays the 9, the best play is to finesse against the J in West hand, playing the 10 from North. You are hoping West started with J94 and East with the singleton Q.

### 20. Avoid any unilateral decision on the 1st round of bidding.

I learned this sound advice from Gavin Wolpert on his Bridge Winners site. If you haven't been there: bridgewinners.com, you should definitely give it a try. It's free and there are worthwhile articles for every level player. My favorite is a brilliant video by Gavin, detailing how the expert mind works as he shares his thoughts from all 52 final hands from his 2011 NABC Open Pairs win in "Road to Victory." His point is that if you make an unusual action on your first bid of the hand, it is usually impossible to show your partner what you really have. If you want to "take a view", wait until later in the bidding to take control or use your impeccable judgment.

The tournament was just about to start. This was 19 year old Alice's Tournament debut. Her partner, the March Hare, was nowhere to be found. It was one of his faults to be late for important dates.

So the Mad Hatter, the loose cannon, who never had a partner, was pressed into service

With many strokes of good luck, and one hand to play, Alice and the Mad Hatter were barely ahead of the 5 time defending champions, the King and Queen of Hearts.

It came down to this hand:

# RANK CHANGERS RESPOND TO DISTRICT DIRECTOR'S CONGRATULATORY EMAIL.

Thanks for the nice message.

I achieved this new status by playing with several partners from whom I learned some of the nuances of the game. I was in the hospital last summer with a broken hip. Several people from my bridge club (actually, the two Tallahassee clubs) visited me, sent me get well cards and email messages, and phoned me.

When I returned home, I received a welcome announcement from the director and rides to enable me to return to play. These experiences and the friendly atmosphere encouraged me to play more frequently. This was especially important since my main partner was hospitalized for six months before he died. Having a supportive group of people was very important during that difficult period. Moreover, our club started a mentorship program where experienced players help people at my level, and now I will become a mentor for one of the new members.

Finally our club encourages some of the newer players by having a variety of games -- Pro-Am where newer players are paired with more experienced players, 8-is-enough team game where newer players learn about team games with a team consisting of players covering the spectrum of achievement.

# President's Message

Well, the heat has arrived and the tourists and snowbirds have departed. The games are a bit smaller now but there is still a lot going on. By the time this article goes to press, we will have held our annual Membership Luncheon, where we recognize the Unit winners of the Helen Shanbrom Ace of Clubs and Mini-McKenney races. We also thank our volunteers, the absolute key to a successful organization. I continue to visit our member clubs with the goal of playing in all of them before the end of the year. The Unit Board of Directors has been busy on two fronts: innovation and youth bridge.

On the innovation front, we have been gathering input from our members; some we have put into practice and some we are still discussing. I want to highlight a few examples:

- For our January 2018 Sectional, the Board has agreed to incur a budget deficit by holding the tournament in a very nice location: the Devyn, which many of you know is frequently used for weddings and proms and such. We will see how it goes, but the key to our evaluation will be additional feedback from the membership.
- We continue to aggressively support on-line bridge, allowing our members to play in various regional tournaments while staying here in the Sarasota area. We have done this for two Gold Rush events in conjunction with Florida regionals, and in April, our Bradenton club hosted players who went on-line in a two-session one day Open Fast Pairs at the Gatlinburg Regional. We expect to have repeated that for the Cincinnati Regional in June. Teresa Noa is spearheading this.
- We are discussing moving our sectionals from Fri-Sat-Sun to Thu-Fri-Sat, which would reduce rents paid by allowing us to book local churches. We are also exploring changing session times, to start earlier and finish earlier.
- We are going to restore the seeding committee, headed by Les Bart, to balance our fields more evenly.
- We are discussing having mentors and possibly a Mentors Month, capped by another proam type game.

Our youth bridge also continues to grow. We now have two programs, one at Gocio Elementary and another at the Boys and Girls Club. Both groups sent players to our May sectional, where they got pizza (and the adults didn't). Iris Wilson, who leads this effort, is also organizing our first ever bridge camp, a one week session for youth, that will be held at the G&G In-Between Club. We are planning for several dozen young people and have already lined up the appropriate number of teachers.

Good luck to everyone traveling to Toronto!!



As I write, it is late May and the outside temperatures are straddling 85 degrees. That means most of our snowbirds have flown the coop for cooler climes. That means there is plenty of room invite your party



bridge friends to convert to duplicate. Airconditioning is included.

If you really miss playing for points with your perennial snowbird pals, you might want to look into the new "tablet" games offered at some regionals. As long as your club is participating in these collaborative regional-club events, one of your members can invite a distant snowbird to partner in these games, as long as that partner's club is also participating.

Thanks to Sue Smith, Pensacola DBC has participated in each of these "onlineonly" two-session Gold Point games. The first was a Gold Rush event, limited to players with fewer than 750 masterpoints. Others have been Open games. The latest one (as of this writing) was via the Gatlinburg Regional held in April of this year. Sixtytwo pairs competed, so there were lots of points available. Participating clubs in Florida included Jacksonville, The Villages and Oneco (Sarasota-Bradenton area) in addition to Pensacola. Other clubs playing in this game were in Ohio, Arkansas, New York, Missouri, Indiana and Nova Scotia.

Twenty five pairs earned gold points all without travel or hotel expenses!

Mishoe and Judith Watson were 1st in C for one session, which was good for 3.06 gold points.

If you want to try this, ask your club's manager or administrator. If your club already participates in "The Common Game," then your club should receive an invitation to participate in these Regional Online-Only games. To get involved, you can send an email to Sara@TheCommonGame.com. Please note that pre-registration and payment are required, as is being signed up to play on BBO (Bridge Base Online). You'll have to fill out a convention card on BBO and attend a practice session a few days ahead of the game itself. If you have not played on BBO before, there are BBO "primers" and "crash courses" available. The day of the game, you simply go to your club (or any pre-registered and tested place with internet and enough space and an assigned monitor) 20-30 minutes early, sign in with the login instructions made available to the game monitor, have one player from each pair invite his or her partner to the table via the BBO game site, and then play.

Yes, that sounds like a lot of little steps. And yes, you have to be mindful of your time zone (for Pensacola in the Gatlinburg E-game, that meant a start-time of 7:30 AM). But there's Gold Without Going Anywhere!

# Sanford's response:

1a) Mutual trust and respect; b) Ability of both players to concentrate and stay focused at all times; c) Styles are compatible or at least complimentary; d) Constructive discussions about mistakes, errors, and misunderstandings between rounds or after the game rather than playing the blame game in front of opponents; e) Like a cornerback in football, be able to, and allow partner to, move on after disasters; f) Make bids and defensive plays that make things as easy as possible for partner, and keep your partner in the picture at all times; g) Frequent review and updating of your convention card; h) Your combined styles make opponents guess last

# Bella's response:

1) I think that a good partnership is one formed by respect, trust, and a mutual goal to have fun, compete and do well. You should not forget that your partner is your best friend at the table and has your best interest at heart. It does not help to argue or pick on partner when things go wrong, as that seems to make matters much worse. I enjoy playing most with the people that forgive my mistakes, make me laugh and do not make me nervous. Those sessions seem to bring out the best results.

Say hi to David, Sanford, & Bella when you see them at the club. Lastly, at year end, please cast your vote for your next board, and see me ASAP if you're interested in running. Our board needs hard workers who want to make our tournaments better.
